Employers are offering guidance to young students who seek it. *The Marlowe Evolution* spoke to events co-ordinator John Tranter, who works for the EBP Kent (Education Business Partnership) whose role is to engage with the employers to come to these workshops to inspire young people in choosing a career that suits them best. EBP Kent is based in the Kent Innovation Centre in Broadstairs. They work with many schools around Kent. John told us "Times like this are tough, but schools like this do a fantastic job." *As you look around you see a future and chances waiting for the youth of the Academy.*

Marks and Spencer is a very well known national brand for clothing, food and other household wares, *writes James Rankin.*

Upon interview with Marks and Spencer managers Keileigh Rankin and Lyn Lye, *The Marlowe Evolution* unearthed an insight into how the company goes about the most important business, the intake of new recruits.

The Marlowe Evolution has found out that anyone can apply for a position at M&S, no matter what level of education. The possibilities are endless as the managers themselves quoted:

'Positions in Human Resource, Operations, Sales and many more are open to those who want them...without the necessity of having a university degree.'

To those that do, however, a graduate scheme is available. This introduces graduates to the world of management with ample opportunity for promotion, but not, as I have been assured, unless the individual wants to be promoted, the company are keen to keep their employees happy and working at the level that they want to work.

When asked why the managers were representing their company at the Marlowe Academy Skills Fest, they replied: 'It is all about the passion for our company we work for and we wish to spread our reach to newer horizons and to the next generation, thus sharing their passion and keenness with others.'

When asked about what character they want to see in those who are interested in joining the company, *The Marlowe Evolution* was told there is no ideal employee so long as that person is passionate about what they do, and



want to work to the best of their ability then they would be good for the job. For those that are interested in applying for positions at any level, or are wishing to gather some work experience, then the best way to do so would be to check the M&S website each week as any new job openings are listed on their website, along with the branches that have the vacancy or those who are interested in obtaining a work experience placement are encouraged to write to the manager of the nearest local branch. Another company *The Marlowe Evolution* interviewed was Hornby, *writes Billie Haines.* After speaking to

Dane Luckhurst we found that his job was more involved with the marketing side for the Humbrol which is a range of paint. I look at how many products we sell and how it is advertised (television, Facebook are some examples.) When asked what qualifications were needed to work for Hornby, Dale said: 'People that are interested in working for us need the basic A to C GCSE grades and a few A levels would be helpful.'
